What do I need to apply for a chauffeur's license? (Choose tab) To apply for a standard chauffeur's license at a Secretary of State office, you will need to provide: Your current Michigan driver's license Proof of citizenship or legal presence in the United States Proof of your Social Security number (if you're applying for an enhanced chauffeur's license) To apply for a chauffeur's license, you will need to provide at least one document proving your legal presence in the United States: Valid, unexpired U.S. passport or passport card Certified birth certificate with stamp or raised seal issued by a U.S. government unit or U.S. territory government office Consular Report of Birth Abroad issued by the U.S. State Department (FS-240, DS-1350, or FS-545) Certificate of Citizenship (N-560 or N-561) Certificate of Naturalization (N-550, N-570, N-578) Permanent Resident Card (Green Card) Valid, unexpired Permanent Resident Card (I-551) or other evidence of permanent residency (I-551 visa/stamp in passport or on I-94) Valid Employment Authorization Document (I-766) Valid, unexpired foreign passport with U.S. visa and evidence of entry: - F-visa holders: Form I-20 - J-visa holders: DS-2019 - Not acceptable: B1 and B2 visas and WB, and WT visa stamps Other immigration documents that show legal presence and/or ability to work in the U.S., including Form I-94, State Department bio-data form, and supervision documents (other documents may be accepted) Expired immigration documents along with Form I-797 (Notice of Action) showing that new documents have been applied for Documents may need to be verified by the federal Systematic Alien Verification for Entitlements (SAVE) System. To be issued a chauffeur's license, you will need to complete and pass the following tests at your Secretary of State office visit: Vision test Written knowledge exam In place of the written knowledge exam, you can also provide a valid commercial driver's license or commercial learner's permit. Schedule an office visit Provide payment using a credit or debit card (additional fees apply), cash, or check or money order made payable to the State of Michigan for chauffeur's license fees. Frequently asked questions (FAQs) Unless you are exempt, you need a chauffeur's license if you: Are employed for the principal purpose of operating a motor vehicle with a gross vehicle weight rating (GVWR) of 10,000 pounds or more Operate a motor vehicle as a carrier of passengers or as a common or contract carrier of property Operate a bus or a school bus Additional information about requirements and exemptions is listed in the TS-025 Your Michigan Chauffeur License brochure. Some situations are exempt from requiring a chauffeur's license. The fee for a chauffeur's license is \$35. If you are a U.S. citizen and would like to obtain an enhanced chauffeur's license, the fee is \$50 (proof of U.S. citizenship is required). If you have a valid commercial driver's license or a commercial learner's permit, you don't need to pass the chauffeur's knowledge exam, as the information in the exam is covered in the commercial driver's license exam. Also, you don't need to take the chauffeur's knowledge exam if you have a Michigan chauffeur's license that expired in the last 4 years. Yes, you will need to pass a 15-question knowledge exam. Knowledge exams are taken at a testing station using a computer screen. To help you prepare for the exam, the TS-025 Your Michigan Chauffeur License brochure is available on our website. No driving skills test is required unless you have never been licensed. The chauffeur's license exam is available in English, Spanish, and Arabic. If your license is misplaced, you will need to provide multiple documents to prove your identity (U.S. passport, birth certificate, etc.) and your citizenship. If you are a U.S. citizen, you can apply for an enhanced chauffeur's license. Proof of U.S. citizenship is required, such as a certified birth certificate or U.S. passport. If the Michigan Department of State hasn't verified your Social Security Number, proof of your SSN is needed, such as a Social Security card or tax form. A document showing the last four numbers of your SSN can be accepted, but you must verbally provide the full number. Michigan's chauffeur license is a crucial credential for individuals who wish to drive commercial vehicles within the state. This license ensures drivers possess the necessary skills and knowledge to uphold safety standards on public roads. Criteria for Obtaining a Chauffeur License in Michigan To obtain a chauffeur license in Michigan, applicants must meet specific criteria outlined in the Michigan Vehicle Code. Applicants must be at least 16 years old, though those under 18 require a Level 2 or Level 3 graduated driver's license to demonstrate adequate driving experience. A vision test is required to confirm applicants can safely operate a vehicle. They must also provide proof of legal presence in the United States, such as a birth certificate or valid passport. The application process includes a \$35 fee to cover processing and issuance of the license. Additionally, individuals must have no outstanding suspensions, revocations, or denials on their driving record, underscoring the importance of maintaining a clean driving history. Test Components The testing process for a Michigan chauffeur license evaluates an applicant's knowledge and driving ability. A written knowledge test focuses on traffic laws, road signs, and safe driving practices as outlined in the Michigan Driver's Manual. For those applying to drive larger commercial vehicles, a road test may be required. This evaluates a candidate's ability to safely navigate traffic, perform lane changes, park, and adhere to speed limits. Chauffeurs operating vehicles designed to carry 16 or more passengers must obtain a Commercial Driver's License (CDL) with a passenger endorsement, which involves additional knowledge and skills assessments to meet federal safety standards. Insurance Requirements for Chauffeur License Holders In Michigan, chauffeur license holders are subject to specific insurance requirements to legally operate commercial vehicles. The state mandates no-fault insurance, which includes personal injury protection, property protection, and residual liability coverage. Chauffeurs face stricter requirements due to the commercial nature of their activities. Commercial vehicle operators must carry higher liability limits than private drivers. Michigan law sets the minimum liability coverage at \$20,000 per person, \$40,000 per accident for bodily injury, and \$10,000 for property damage. Many commercial operators opt for higher coverage limits to safeguard against lawsuits and claims, particularly when transporting passengers or valuable cargo. Failure to maintain the required insurance can result in fines, license suspension, and potential civil liability. Chauffeurs must ensure their insurance policies are current and meet state requirements to avoid these consequences. Penalties for Non-Compliance Driving without a valid chauffeur license in Michigan is a serious offense, punishable by misdemeanor charges and fines of up to \$500. Such violations can negatively impact a driver's record, leading to increased insurance premiums and difficulties in obtaining or renewing a license. Repeat offenses carry harsher penalties, such as extended license suspensions or revocations. These measures aim to protect public safety by removing unqualified drivers from the road. Legal Defenses and Exceptions Certain defenses and exceptions may apply to Michigan's chauffeur license requirements. A necessity defense might be used if a driver argues the violation was unavoidable due to an emergency, such as transporting someone in need of medical attention. Drivers may also challenge the legality of a traffic stop or the evidence collected. If constitutional rights were violated during the stop, such as unlawful searches or seizures under the Fourth Amendment, evidence may be excluded. These defenses require careful consideration of the circumstances surrounding the violation. Your Are Here: Michigan Insurance >> How to obtain Michigan Chauffeur License Who needs a Michigan Chauffeur License You will need a Michigan Chauffeur License if any conditions apply. Are employed to operate a motor vehicle with a gross vehicle weight rating (GVWR) of 10,000 pounds or more. (See note below.) Operate a motor vehicle as a carrier of passengers or as a common or contract carrier of property. Operate a bus or a school bus. More detailed information is available at the Michigan Secretary of State. Michigan law state that: Michigan law considers someone an employee for the principal purpose of operating a motor vehicle "when the person's employment customarily involves the necessary use of a motor vehicle for hire or for transporting passengers for hire, or for transporting for gain or hire any merchandise for display, sale, or delivery." (MCL 257.6(2)) How do you apply for a Michigan Chauffeur License? To obtain a Michigan chauffeur license: You need to be at least 16 years of age, have completed segments 1 and 2 of driver education, and hold a Graduated Driver's License Level 2 or 3. You must pass the written chauffeur license knowledge test. (They will require a skills test if this is your first time with a license). Pay the \$35 license fee. To operate certain commercial vehicles, you may need a commercial driver's license and a chauffeur license. However, In Michigan becoming a Transportation Network driver does not require a chauffeur's license. Click the link on information for Michigan requirements for Uber and Lyft drivers. Who is exempt from needing a Chauffeur License? You will not need a Michigan Chauffeur license in the following instances. A farmer or farmer's employee operates a vehicle exclusively connected to the farming operation. All firefighter or members of fire departments that drives an ambulance. A firefighter or police officer operating equipment used exclusively in their employment. Utility companies hire employees to drive trucks transporting employees, materials, and tools. Service or repair personnel who operate vehicles carry their tools and transport parts or appliances only incidentally to their employment. Any Emergency medical services personnel is operating an ambulance. County road commission employees and other employees of local units of government who do not drive their vehicles and whose work consists of hauling road-building materials and supplies for the road commission or other municipal purposes. Michigan DOT employee's work consists of operating vehicles with a GVWR of 10,000 pounds or more to transport highway and bridge maintenance materials and supplies for state trunkline maintenance. Anyone operating a motor vehicle for a volunteer program only receives reimbursement for vehicle operating costs. Anyone who operates a motor home for personal use. Parent or parent's representative transport students to or from school-related events. Taxical drivers, limousine drivers, or transport drivers such as (Uber or Lyft drivers). You may need a Commercial Drivers license if the following conditions applies: A vehicle towing a trailer or other vehicle with a GVWR of 10,001 pounds or more when the GCWR is 26,001 pounds. Vehicles (including buses) have 26,001 pounds or more GVWR. A vehicle under 26,001 pounds GVWR that: Vehicles that carry 16 or more persons (including the driver) Takes hazardous materials in amounts requiring unique warning labels.
