Nationals from certain countries can use eGates, details of which are available on another webpage. In some cases, you might need to get your passport stamped by a Border Force official; further information is online. If you're not traveling within this timeframe, you'll have to apply for a replacement and there may be a fee plus extra biometrics required. If you chose to collect your biometric residence permit from a Post Office while applying, your decision letter will state which branch you've been allocated based on your visa application postcode. Check the Post Office website for info on participating branches and opening hours. You need to pick up your BRP at the Post Office before your entry vignette expires or within 10 days of arriving in the UK, whichever is later. Your decision letter will also specify when you can collect your permit. When visiting the right Post Office branch, bring your passport; it's a good idea to bring your decision letter as well for reference purposes. No appointment is needed for BRP collection. Failing to do so might result in penalties or cancellation of leave. If you want to pick up your permit from a different Post Office, contact them and be prepared to pay a fee. If you're unable to collect your BRP yourself, an exception can be made, such as if you're under 18 without a parent, medically unable to attend, or an unaccompanied minor. For minors collecting their BRP at a Post Office not with a parent, they must be accompanied by an adult responsible for them, such as someone in a pastoral care role. There are alternative collection methods available: organisations like schools and sponsors can request that permits be sent directly to a specified address. This service is mainly for students, skilled workers, and large volume sponsors. If you lose or have your Biometric Residence Permit (BRP) stolen, it's crucial that you report it as soon as possible. The organisation responsible for providing resettlement support will arrange the delivery of your biometric residence permit if needed. This article explains how to handle a lost BRP and provides information on the recent changes to the BRP process. UK Visas & Immigration (UKVI) has made some adjustments to the Biometric Residence Permit (BRP) process, including issuing BRP letters via email instead of physical ones. Customers should ensure they provide their own personal email address when applying for a visa, as this will be used to send the BRP letter. A Biometric Residence Permit (BRP) is a document that foreign nationals receive after being granted a visa or immigration permission to live, study, or work in the UK. It serves as proof of your immigration status and is usually issued when applying for a visa lasting more than 6 months or extending an existing one. For those who wish to avoid collecting their Biometric Residence Permit (BRP) from a post office, an alternative option is available. Certain organisations, such as legal representatives or large-volume sponsors, can become accredited Alternative Collection Locations (ACLs). By instructing SSW to handle visa applications, clients can have their BRP sent securely to the company's office address for collection or forwarding to their personal address. Upon receipt of the BRP, a dedicated SSW Account Manager will notify the client. For those who applied within the UK, the BRP is typically dispatched to the address provided in the application and does not require collection. It usually arrives within 10 working days following the decision letter from the Home Office confirming permission to stay in the UK. However, recent changes mean that employers and landlords can no longer accept BRPs for right-to-work or right-to-rent checks; instead, applicants must prove their status online or through other means. The BRP remains valid for verifying identity, right to study, access to public services, and eligibility for benefits. If a BRP is not received or has been lost or stolen, individuals can still prove their immigration status using alternative methods. For those needing to leave the UK before obtaining their BRP, a 'replacement BRP visa' can be applied for at a cost of £154. This allows re-entry into the UK once only. In case of a lost or stolen BRP, it is essential to report the incident promptly to the Home Office; failure to do so within three months may result in fines up to £1,000 and deportation from the country if applicable. You can extend your visa if you want to stay in the UK beyond its expiration date, which would automatically grant you a new Biometric Residence Permit (BRP). If your BRP is lost or stolen while abroad, report it outside the UK and apply for a 'replacement BRP visa' instead of trying to get a replacement inside the country. This temporary document lets you re-enter the UK once but costs £154. You can apply for a replacement when you return to the UK within three months unless you have a valid reason like being unable to return due to unforeseen circumstances. If your reported BRP turns up later, don't use it - instead, get a new one or apply for a 'replacement BRP visa' if you're abroad. When your new replacement arrives, cut the old one into pieces and mail it to the Home Office at PO Box 195 Bristol BS20 1BT. Notably, all BRPs will expire on December 31, 2024, as the government transitions to digital immigration statuses starting from January 1, 2025. You won't need a physical BRP after this date; instead, you can prove your immigration status online without one. When do I need a Biometric Residence Permit (BRP)? You may need a BRP if you extend your visa beyond 6 months, apply to settle in the UK, transfer your visa to a new passport, or apply for certain Home Office travel documents. Do children need a BRP? Children under 16 are required to provide biometric information, including fingerprints and a photograph of their face. However, they may not be asked to give a signature. What information will the card show? Your BRP contains personal details, such as your name, date and place of birth, fingerprints and photo, visa information and national insurance number. The card also has security features like an electronic chip and special markings. If you're applying from within the UK, your BRP processing will take around 7-10 days after receiving your Home Office decision letter. It'll be delivered by courier to your home address or the address provided in your application. If you haven't received it by ten days, report it as missing to the Home Office. If you applied from outside the UK, collect your BRP at a named post office branch or with your UK sponsor once you arrive. You must collect it before the expiry date on your travel document or within ten days of reaching the UK, failing which may result in a £1,000 fine. The cost of providing biometric information in the UK is £19.20, and this fee includes processing your BRP application. The card itself will contain biographic and biometric data, as well as information about your immigration status. It's valid for the duration of your leave to remain in the UK. You must present it with your passport at the UK border if you're leaving or re-entering. In case of an error on your BRP, such as a spelling mistake or incorrect leave details, report it within 10 days online. For more complex issues, seek an administrative review. If your card is lost or stolen, report it to the Home Office and apply for a replacement within three months; failure to do so may result in a £1,000 fine. If you are a resident of the UK with indefinite leave to remain, also known as ILR, and your Biometric Residence Permit (BRP) is lost or expired, there are steps you can take. In the event that your BRP is lost outside the UK, it is necessary to report this and apply for a replacement visa, which will cost £154, allowing you to re-enter the country. However, upon return, you must then apply for a full replacement permit. For individuals with ILR whose BRP has expired, they can apply online from within the UK for a replacement. If your visa is also nearing expiration, it's crucial to first apply for an extension and, if successful, you will automatically receive a new BRP. Having ILR does not necessarily require holding a BRP, but many opt for one as it facilitates easier travel into the country, serves as recognizable proof of the right to work in the UK, and provides access to public benefits with enhanced security features against fraud. To transfer ILR status to a BRP, individuals can make a No Time Limits (NTL) application if they lack documentary evidence of their ILR, have lost or had their passport stolen, or if it has expired, as well as in cases of changed identity. Eligibility for NTL requires valid ILR status that has not been compromised by absence and continued eligibility for ILR. The NTL application must be submitted within the UK on the designated form with a fee of £229, including biometric data collection. A decision is typically made within 6 months, but priority service can expedite this process for an additional £800, offering a decision by the end of the day or within two working days after a weekend appointment. For those with temporary leave to remain, online applications are possible at a cost of £161, with decisions made within 8 weeks and optional priority service available. Commonwealth citizens without documents proving their right to remain may be eligible for a BRP under the Windrush Scheme. Seeking legal advice from an immigration solicitor can provide valuable guidance on ILR applications and obtaining a biometric residence permit to prove status in the UK. From January 1st 2025 onwards, students will no longer receive physical BRPs but instead an eVisa which contains their immigration details online. This change is also applicable to EU and EEA nationals who submitted applications through the UK Immigration: ID Check app; in this case, they'll get a digital status for proof of immigration. It's worth noting that BRPs are distinct from biometric residence cards (BRCs), often referred to as 'UK residence cards', which are issued to family members of EU/EEA/Swiss/Norwegian/Icelandic/Liechtenstein nationals in the UK.
